PRESIDENT'S CORNER

Post-Holiday Greetings:

I hope everyone had a great holiday season. The year is 2020, if you can believe that. Spring time is rejuvenating for most living creatures on earth and humans are no exception. Let's hope the government rejuvenates "For the People".

Just the other day I was reading an editorial about the circle of despair related to Big Pharma drugs and their distribution. Here is the basic content of that editorial. (Reprinted by permission of the author)

"Drug Addiction is Big Business. Why? Everyone makes money from it, it's a win-win (sarcasm inserted here) in the end the only people that really lose are the families and the addict themselves. It's cheaper for me to buy oxycodone on the street than it is for me to afford my asthmatic daughters' inhaler with insurance. As far as addiction goes, the pharmaceutical/insurance companies line their pockets with blood money. Say your child breaks their arm or has surgery and is prescribed oxycodone. Why are we not testing for pain tolerance instead of automatically giving them the strongest drug out there so they numb everything, not just the injury. The more the doctors prescribe the more money they get in kickbacks from the company. A lot of times it's a hospital policy because there was a closed-door deal made to get rid of so much product. Do the doctors do it knowingly? Maybe, but I choose to believe it's just a policy they are following from administrators just like we follow every day in our non-medical jobs. Then what happens? The surgery/injury is over and the patient is healed. But they still want that feeling that numbs them from everyday life. Where do they find it? Some are lucky and have the ability to kick the habit on their own, but others stop getting prescribed and end up seeking that feeling from street drugs (which are predominately produced by Big Pharma). Do the pharmaceutical/insurance companies know this? Of course, they do. Rehab is the next step, whether it's inpatient or outpatient the insurance companies are now getting rich off the backs of the families begging for help. Sending their loved ones to rehab after rehab to try to get them clean and off the street. And what happens to the families? They go broke doing everything they can to save the soul of the person they love. And what if the addict starts to steal for money to buy drugs, then who gets hurt? All of us, we pay to house them in our jails and we pay with insurance rates for the items the addict stole. So here we are full circle with the insurance companies paying our deductibles to cover our losses.

I used to believe that addicts had no reason to live, no reason to exist in this world. Now I believe that although our loved one is to blame for their actions, so are so many others. And don't forget about those basic needs of prescriptions we can't afford because the pharmaceutical and insurance companies aren't making big enough profits. It's a win-win for everyone except for us, and the millions of other families doing things they never thought they would be capable of to help their loved ones and break the "Circle of Pain" the drugs are supposed to cure."

This is a compelling story regarding complicit Pharmaceutical Companies in the drug addiction business and the drug economy. Recently I watched a documentary regarding Big Pharma and the opioid crisis in America. It seems like they are pushing so much oxycodone and other narcotic drugs that West Virginia consumes the equivalent of 66.5 pills per person. According to the Drug Enforcement Administration's ARCOS database, Norton, Va. received 306 pills per person living there.

Turing Pharmaceuticals hiked the cost of one drug to fight parasitic infections to \$750 a pill from \$13.50. The equivalent medication sold in England for 43 pence (66 cents).

The SCREA board will watch for the latest legislation to control the greed and avarice of big Pharma. In the US House of Representatives HR 3 is the "**Elijah Cummings Lower Drug costs Now Act of 2019**" waiting for the Congressional Budget Office to complete its analysis. Also, in California, ACR 105 (**Assembly Concurrent Resolution #105**) which is an attempt to coordinate the purchase of prescription drugs through a partnership with the States of Washington and Oregon and other states across the country, who wish to lower drug prices. Let's hope something works. We will keep you informed.

Deferred Compensation News

With the December 20, 2019 passage of the SECURE Act, the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) age for a 457(b) Deferred Compensation plan has been increased from 70 ½ to 72, with the following provisions:

- RMD age increase from 70½ to 72 is applicable to distributions made after December 31, 2019, for individuals who reach 70½ from January 1, 2020 forward.
- Can now start deferred RMD by age 72 regardless of prior distributions.
- RMD calculation is still based on IRS requirement as well as account balance/life expectancy.
- The IRS penalty for a failure to take distribution by 72 remains at 50% of what you should have taken as RMD .

Widowed Persons Association of California (WPAC)

The Widowed Persons Association of California, Sacramento-Chapter #1 is a 501(c) 3 non-profit non-denominational community service organization and support group which is dedicated to helping all widowed people overcome the grief and confusion of being widowed and to help them learn to live and laugh again. WPAC was organized in 1986 and is an independent organization. They have an office that provides full services ranging from recovering from grief to social activities suitable for most widowed people.

Support programs are provided with no cost to participants. Some programs are listed below.

Sunday Support is a peer support group that meets every Sunday at 2628 El Camino Avenue, Suite D18 from 3:00 pm to 5:00 pm. The meeting is followed by a no-host shared meal at a local restaurant (attendance voluntary).

Recovery Workshops are offered 4 times per year for 6 weeks and are announced in their monthly newsletter and at the Sunday Support meetings. The components of these workshops are understanding grief; sadness/anxiety/depression; changing roles and relationships; beginning a new life; and review of topics in previous sessions. These workshops encourage making new friends and moving forward.

Coping with the Holidays are workshops held in November and December.

Social Activities range from casual breakfasts, luncheons and dinners to gala parties. Bus trips are offered to theater events, ball games, casinos and other venues. Their recreation room has daily events such as card games, potlucks and other social activities.

Continued participation does require membership in the organization. Office staff or facilitators can explain the requirements and cost of membership. Annual dues are kept as reasonable as possible.

WPAC offers a monthly no-host **Newcomer's Buffet** where prospective members can meet members and learn more about the organization. This buffet is open to all widowed people. Membership is not required to attend. There is no cost other than the menu items of your choice.

The Presidential Primary Election is Coming March 3rd!

Now that the holidays are over and the new year has begun, it's time to get ready for California's March Presidential Primary election. Yes, that's right. The primary this year is in March, *not June*. And since it's a presidential primary, you need to make sure you're registered correctly if you want to vote for a presidential candidate. Yes, that's right again. California is a 'Top Two Primary' state, but that doesn't apply to presidential candidates. Party registration affects which presidential candidates you will see on your ballot card. Here are some tips to make voting in the March 3rd election a little easier:

- Presidential candidates only show on 'political party' ballots.
- If you are registered as No Political Party, also known as non-partisan or decline-to-state, you need to request (also known as 'cross-over') a party's ballot if you want to vote for their presidential candidate.
- Not all political parties allow non-partisan voters to join in their election. Check your voting materials for the specific parties that are allowing cross-over voting in this election.
- If you are registered with one political party, you cannot get another political party's ballot.
- Republican party does not allow non-Republicans to vote for their presidential candidates. You must be registered as a Republican to vote a Republican ballot.

Yes, that's a lot to take in, but here are more tips....

- If you are a vote by mail voter, your ballot will be mailed to you starting February 3rd. But it may take your registrar a few days to get all these ballots mailed out.
- For vote by mail voters - Sign your envelope before you return it!
- Check with your county for specific voting instructions – some are using the new 'all vote by mail' model and some are using the existing 'polling place' model.
- Contact your county's Registrar for information on your county's election systems. A full list of County Registrars is available on the Secretary of State's website, <https://www.sos.ca.gov/elections/voting-resources/county-elections-offices/>.

All Counts on You!

Once-in-a-decade census is information used for voting, services, funding and programs. In mid-March 2020, you, along with every household in America, will receive a notice to complete the 2020 Census. You can do this online, by phone, or by mail. Your count is vital!

Accurate census data is used to make critical decisions over the next 10 years. It serves as the basis for how billions of federal dollars are allocated every year for services and programs that make a difference in our lives every day. Examples of funding impacted by census data include money for our local schools, affordable housing, food assistance programs, emergency services and shelters, public safety activities, roads and transportation programs, community parks, senior services, and many others. The census really does count on you. It is estimated that Sacramento County could lose \$1,000 per year for every person not counted in the census—that's \$10,000 per person over a decade! Undercounting by just 100 people could result in \$1 million lost!

Census data can also impact our voting. This critical data is used to set the boundaries of areas represented by elected officials, from city councils and county supervisors to members of the state assembly and senate. Census data also determines the number of seats California receives in the U.S. House of Representatives.

Since 1790, the United States has conducted a census of the population every 10 years—it's the law, mandated by the Constitution. The census asks simple questions such as age, sex, and number of people living in your household, including children. All responses are protected by law and can only be used to produce statistics. Census answers cannot be used against you by any government agency or court in any way.

This is a once-a-decade chance to shape the next 10 years—make it count! More information is available at 2020census.gov and norcalcensus.org.

Carol's Travel Corner



The article in the December newsletter regarding the **Top 10 Reasons to travel with a Travel Insurance Plan** really hit home this year for me. I had two trips planned for the Fall; September in the Netherlands and December in the European Christmas Markets. Luckily, I had travel insurance for both trips. I was able to receive a full refund, minus the cost of the insurance for the September trip within 45 days. I did need a Doctor's verification. All was done with 2 calls and the rest online, or if you are not tech savvy, you can do it by snail mail. What a relief, because this trip was very costly.

For the Christmas Market trip, I was able to reschedule the trip, for December 2020 with very little extra cost. I have always paid the

extra for the travel insurance, but never had to use the service until last year. The cost is worth the peace of mind and, if needed, the refund of almost all your dollar cost. Some include the flight cost, if you book through them.
